The Collaborative Assessment and Management of Suicidality ("CAMS") is recognized by the Joint Commission, the Surgeon General, Zero Suicide and the CDC as one of the few *suicide-specific* evidence-based treatments appropriate for addressing suicide risk. The CDC has designated CAMS as a "Well Supported" intervention

### CAMS-4Teens INTERACTIVE TRAINING

CAMS-4Teens was developed to train clinicians on how to adapt and implement the CAMS Framework®, the Suicide Status Form (SSF), and the Stabilization Support Plan for youth ages 12 and older. The training also provides updated information on the nature, epidemiology, and prevention of youth suicide, including a specific focus on reducing access to lethal means and how to work within and across systems of care (hospitals, schools, justice, and outpatient settings).

- Review epidemiological trends regarding suicidal thoughts and behaviors in teens
- Discuss the research to date on using CAMS with teens and young children

- Demonstrate the adherent use of CAMS with adolescents and teens through video demonstrations and discussion
- Discuss ways to incorporate cultural factors within treatment
